OFFICIAL BULLETIN NR 187 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS  
WEST HARTFORD CONN APRIL 25 1949 TO ALL RADIO  
AMATEURS BT All Skeds through May 6th

On April 21 FCC released extensive proposals for changes in amateur regulations. Highlights: Opening of 3800 to 3850 for phone with restrictions 3 kc signal bandwidth also signal bandwidth present 75 and 20 meter phone bands restricted to 6 kc, no expansion other phone bands. Carrier shift telegraph 29 to 29.7 Mc. Signal bandwidth 6 kc for phone between 29.65 and 29.7 mc and 10 kc in remaining phone band. An entirely new system of license classes is proposed. Class A licenses would not be reissued after 1950. Amateurs wishing operate phone 75 and 20 meters would then have to take new exam including 20 WPM code test. A technician class is proposed with 5 WPM code test and privileges only above 220 Mc. A novice class is proposed with 5 WPM code test and reduced technical requirements with privileges in small portions various bands and nonrenewable license good for one year. Details in June QST and mailed to affiliated Club secretaries. These are not new regulations but only FCC proposals. AR

Hello Girls:

We have a problem on our hands regarding Field Day. As you may know, it is proposed to cook meals for the men during that time which would entail supper Saturday night, and breakfast and lunch on Sunday. It was suggested that meal tickets for each meal needed were made up and sold to those requiring them, that we should have some idea how many to cater for, and I for one thought it was a very good idea, but at the last meeting this was out-voted in favour of everyone giving so much, and any of them would be able to eat when they wanted to. This may be quite a good idea in many ways, but it still doesn't give us any idea how many to cater for. We want to have enough food, and yet on the other hand, we don't want a lot left over as it would just be wasted. So I still think that meal tickets for those who want them would be a much better idea. I don't think the men realize how much work is entailed and how much organization is need for a proposition such as this. Also they don't know much about the cost of food or it would never have been suggested that 25¢ would be OK for three meals, I'm afraid it will be more like \$1.25 for three meals, which even at that isn't a lot. I took it on myself to figure out the cost of breakfast for 25 men and here are the results:

4 Lb. bacon @ 75¢	- \$3.00
3 doz. eggs @ 54¢	- 1.62
5 loaves @ 15¢	- .75
1 lb. margarine @ 40¢	- .40
½ lb. coffee @ 33¢	- .33
1 lb. sugar @ 9¢	- .09
Paper plates and cups	- .50
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b><u>\$ 6.69</u></b>

Say 25¢ per man for a ticket, that gives us \$6.25. So you can see for yourselves that hardly covers it, and a good lunch and supper would cost at least 50¢ EACH. Of course if the

Boys only want toast and tea for breakfast, a couple of sandwiches for lunch and hotdogs for supper, I guess 25¢ for three meals WOULD be enough, but we presume they want a good meal. You know how hungry you get out in the open!

I hope the men will read this, then perhaps they will see what we are up against and that we must know to a near margin how many to cater for. We want you to have decent meals, so how about co-operating and see things from a woman's point of view! Don't you think that under the circumstances, meal tickets would be a much better idea?? Also another thing to consider is, those who want to eat at camp can buy their tickets in advance. Those who will only be there a short while, and those who visit won't need to buy tickets as they won't need a meal. You can buy separate tickets so you only pay for the meals you expect to have.

Another thing girls, the boys want coffee and sandwiches on hand ALL the time. How can it be done for less than \$1.25 or \$1.20?? The idea of 25¢ only is ridiculous.

I had quite a few other things to write about, but this has taken up a lot of space so I will just touch briefly on them.

Quite a few of the XYL's are now full members of the Club and are going to the Theory and Code classes. Eva Colleck, Joyce Kent, Mary Langstaffe and Barb Clarkstone are all studying for their tickets. I think I'll have to show them I can do it too, and take it up myself!

Eva Colleck in particular is going to town on her dode. She does 10 words a minute and she is picking up the theory fast. The Club is very pleased to see the XYL's take this interest and it would be quite an honour for them to have one or more girls with their tickets.

There will be a meeting of the Auxillary by the end of May to discuss and arrange for the catering of the Field Day. You will all be informed in due course and I hope that we shall have a good show of volunteers to help. Let's hope it is a nice weekend too!!

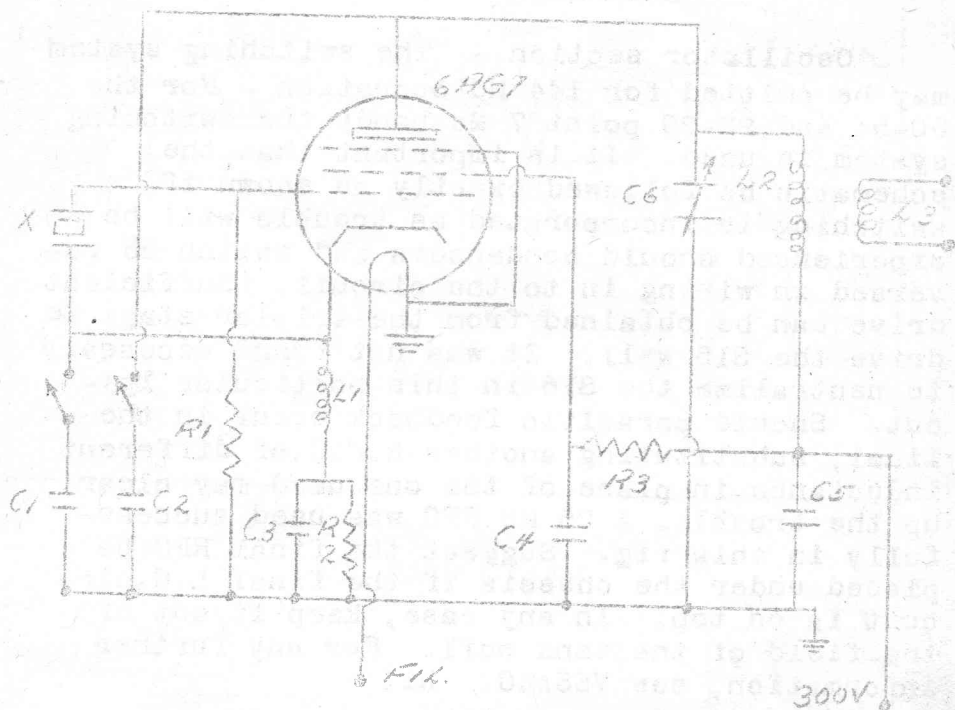
Hi Gang:

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Oscillator section - The switching system may be omitted for 144 MC operation - For the 50-54 and 28-29 point 7 Mc bands the switching system is used. It is important that the schematic be followed exactly as shown if switching is incorporated as trouble will be experienced should condensers and switch be reversed in wiring in to the circuit. Sufficient drive can be obtained from the tripler stage to drive the 815 well. It was not found necessary to neutralize the 815 in this particular layout. Should parasitic feedback occur in the final, substituting another R.F.C. of different inductance in place of the one used may clear up the trouble. A 25 MH RFC was used successfully in this rig. Suggest the final RFC be placed under the chassis if the final L.C. circuit is on top. In any case, keep it out of the field of the tank coil. For any further information, see VE3AZC. Hi!

However, the ZS's, ZD's and also Central and South Americans are still coming in. ZL's still put in an appearance at occasional times.

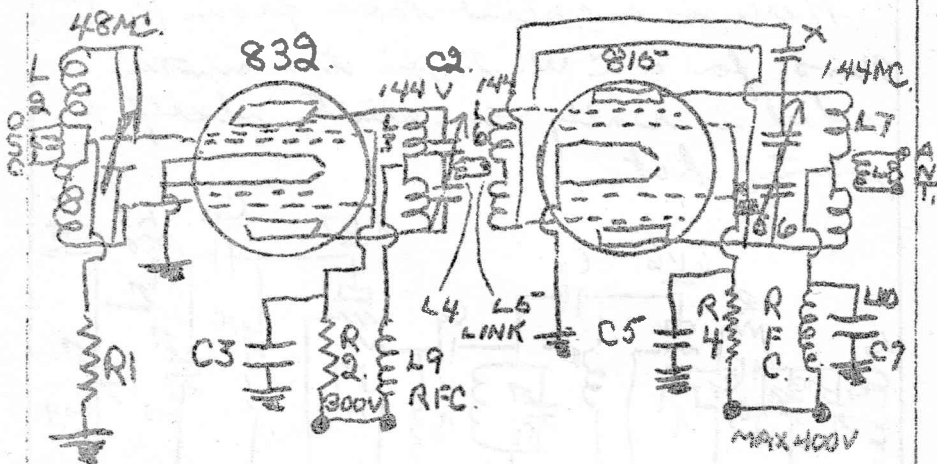
Short skip is putting in a fairly regular appearance now.

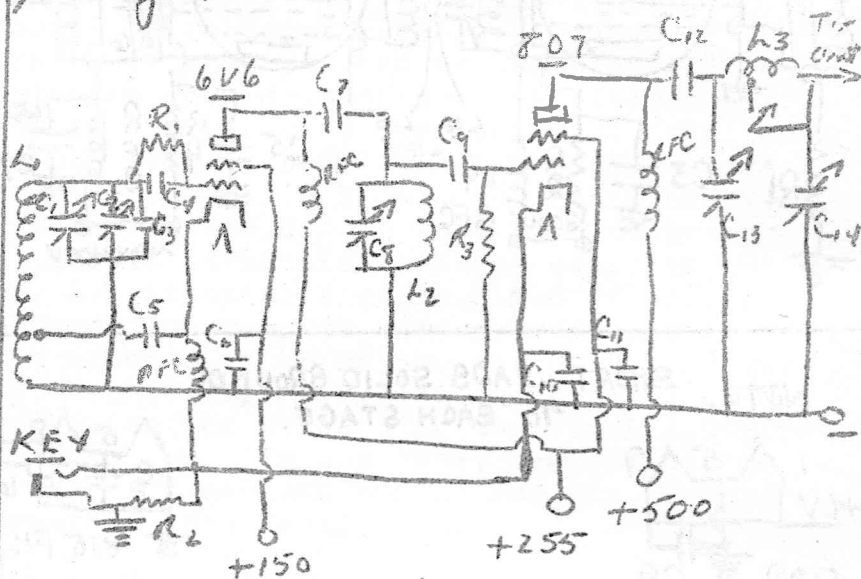
